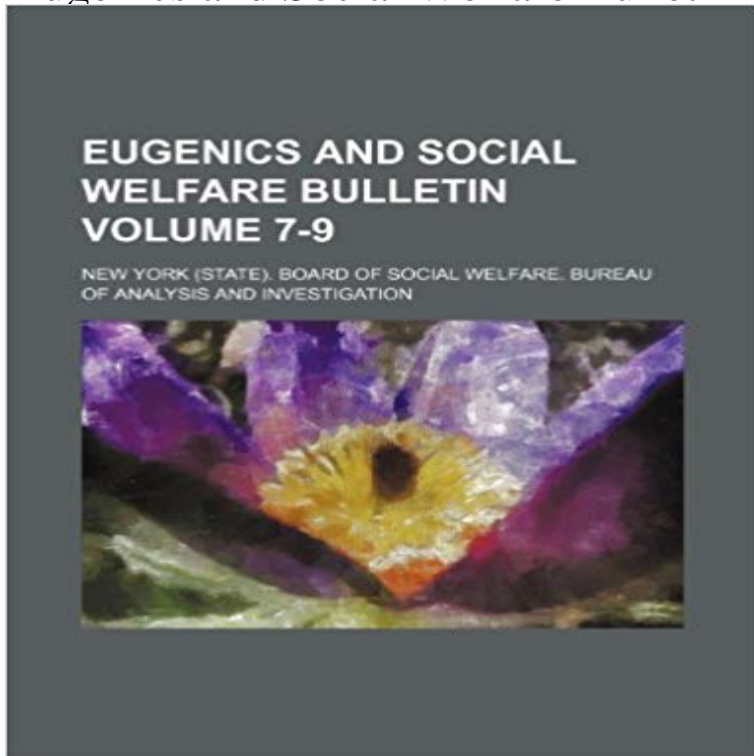

Not illustrated. 1916 Excerpt: ...to the B division of the next higher grade. The only division that had not taken part in the first test was the 2-B. The three details that the children were required to represent are the two children, i. e., the boy and the girl, and the dog. The papers were classified in six groups as follows: Group Contains Hie drawings that sJiow I. Three details, and illustrate the quotation. II. Three details, but do not illustrate the quotation. III. Only the two children. VI. One child and the dog. V. Only one of the required details. VI. Xone of the required details. The drawings that fall in group I are considered the successful ones. The other groups are given to show the entire distribution of the papers. Since the test was conducted according to grades, the papers were first classified by grades to find out if the curve of successes would correspond to that in the four detail test. As shown in Table I, the curve of successes is very irregular from the eighth grade through the special classes. This irregularity is caused by the difference iu the number and composition of each grade. Ior instance, in some of the grades there is a large number of over-age retarded children, while other grades are comparatively free from them. Such a difference will cause a lower grade free from such children to make a better showing than a higher grade which contains them. Table 1 also shows that the 3-A children make a better showing than those in any of the higher grades. This is probably due to the fact that the test is too easy for the ohler children and they are more likely to be careless and fail to bring out the required details. The judgment used by the children was studied by grades, as to proportion, choice of colors and neatness,
