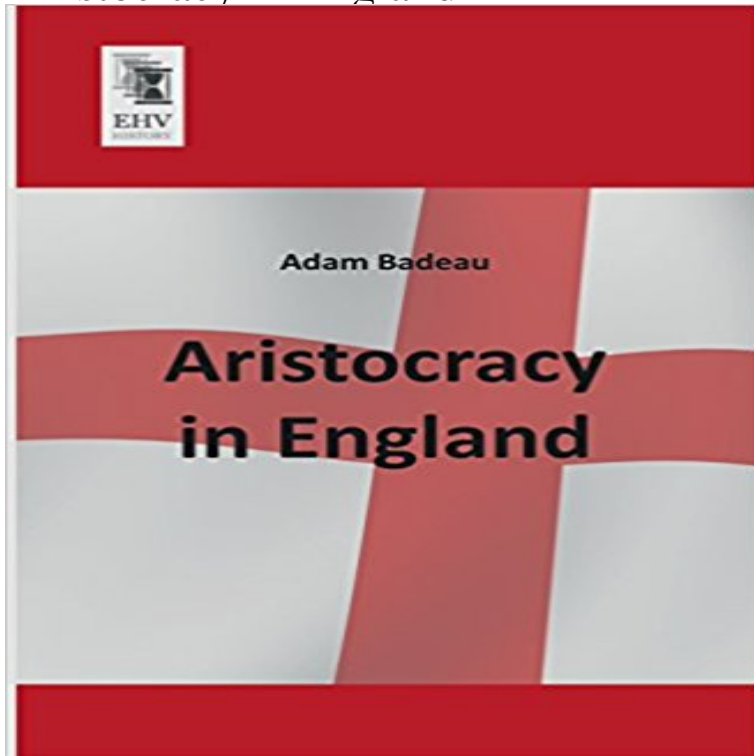


Aristocracy in England
